Pastor's Pause September, 2024



"He himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility" (Eph. 2:14).

Loving people who have neat and tidy lives is easy.

However, if we are going to live out justice and compassion, this means loving those who are not like us, and who do not have orderly lives. This above text challenges us to love those are not just the same as we are.

Loving people who are difficult to love or

simply hard to understand, requires a source outside of ourselves. Our human love has clear limitations. We may be able to pull off loving the unlovable for a while, but that well dries up pretty quickly.

This following text speaks of a love that, lived out daily, comes from the heart of God and it is frequently used for weddings. However, Paul meant it as a unifier for the people of Corinth. Agape love vs romantic love.

First Corinthians 13:4-7 4 Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant 5 or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; 6 it does not rejoice in wrong-doing but rejoices in the truth. 7 It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

What does this look like? Going to places where we are not comfortable: back alleys, housing projects, places where people are lonely and are calling out for help. Do we meet them on our turf or theirs? Do we call them to come to us or do as Christ said by going to them? Indeed, our churches generally have wonderful inhouse programs; maybe some would come, but many will not.

When I lived in south Minneapolis, Marshall was a man who spent his time in our back alley. He never caused any trouble. But he felt unworthy of coming out onto main streets. He was a struggling alcoholic, yet he had a heart that revered God. He and I had some very deep conversations. But my job was not to change him, just to listen. One day as I was headed to my car, there he was.

We said hello and then he announced that the next day was his birthday, and stated it was a day to make a new beginning with God. Sadly, I learned that Marshall had died two days later, trusting God, completely. Sometimes more than I ever did.

Church, it is what we do OUTSIDE the building that matters most. The connections we make. The stories we share. The "church" we experience outside of church. That is where we are stretched and perhaps allow ourselves to be like Christ; to see the goodness and grace in people.

PRAYER: O God, we are a nation desperately in need of healing. May we as a nation humble ourselves and repent of the many sins that foster vitriol and violence. May we be reminded we have more in common than we do differences. And even in those differences, may we find a bridge built of hope, compassion and equity for ALL God's children. May we find a way back to each other with You at the core. Rejoicing in the differences as we move to a common goal of BEING the Gospel. Amen and amen!

NOTES FROM THE AUGUST 22 AD COUNCIL MEETING

- I. Kickoff Sunday September 8 An outdoor service in the south parking lot is planned. The Jumping Jehosafats will provide music for the service. Finger foods will be provided prior to the service. Attendees will be asked to bring lawn chairs, and some chairs from the Fellowship Hall will be available.
- 2. Finance The church Checking Account balance is \$45,355 as of July 31, 2024. The average end of month balance (EOMB) for the first seven months of 2024 is \$50,542, and the average EOMB for all 12 months of 2023 was \$62,300. The EOMB is trending downward and is a result of monthly income being less than monthly expenses. General Fund Pledged Income is at 60% of the total pledged as of July 31, with a target for that date of 58.3%, so 1) General Fund Pledges received are on track and 2) the Checking EOMB decrease is not due to late payment of General Fund pledges. Capital Fund Pledges are at 35% of the total pledged as of July 31 versus the 58.3% target which indicates that Capital Fund Pledge receipts are not on track with the monthly projection for 2024. Late payment of Capital Fund Pledges does reduce the EOMB and funds designated for Capital. All funds received by the church are deposited in the Checking Account, and designated funds (Capital, flowers, music, memorials, Heifer Project, etc.) are recorded and "earmarked" for the designated purpose.
- 3. School Partnership The Pastor has met with Principal Tom Kearney of New Heights School (located at Mulberry and Everett Streets) regarding volunteer opportunities for this Fall. Pastor is very excited at the prospects of how we can joyfully be the hands and feet of God in a place where there is great need. Pastor Jenny will keep you posted as things unfold.
- 4. New office hours 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday with Friday off will start Labor Day week.
- 5. Welcoming Visitors The welcoming effort for obtaining visitor contact information should be concentrated at the Welcome Table in the Gathering Space. Visitors who wish to share their contact information should be encouraged to do so at the Welcome Table and by Pastor announcement to sign a form at the Welcome Table. Use of the attendance forms in the sanctuary will be discontinued.
