PASTOR'S PAUSE DECEMBER 2024



"Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for God who promised is faithful." Hebrews 10:23 (NIV)

In December 2022 I lost one of my best friends to brain cancer. It was one week before Christmas when she passed, and I wasn't sure how I was going to be a pastor and get through the season of Christ's birth. Out of the view of people I was literally functioning one moment at a time.

I wonder if you've ever had a Christmas where things were not as they should have been. Or maybe that describes this holiday season for you.

Perhaps you are:

- Exhausted and overwhelmed by your overfull schedule.
- Financially stretched.
- Buried in bad news.
- Stressed and sleepless because of relationship challenges. You can't go to another festive dinner and pretend everything is OK when it's not.

In other words, the holidays are a mess; you're a mess. Friend, I get it. But skipping over the month of December (especially as a pastor) isn't an option, and even if it were, we'd only carry our old stresses and messes into a new season.

How do we make it through the "most wonderful time of the year" when we've lost our jolliness, and we don't want to "jingle all the way"? Let's cling to Truth. And God's Truth reminds us that, no matter the size of our holiday mess, we are not alone.

From the beginning, Christmas has been messy. If scratch-and-sniff Bibles were a thing, we would smell the stench when we read about the first Christmas in Luke 2. Unlike the beautiful scenes from children's story Bibles, many people shared their living space with their animals. In as such, Jesus' birthplace was a dirty, stinky manger. Jesus was born in a mess!

Think about it: Jesus Christ, Immanuel, which literally means "God with us," chose to be born in a mess. And now Jesus promises to be with us always, even in our mess.

One of the verses I clung to during that sad, messy Christmas was Hebrews 10:23, which says, "Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for God who promised is faithful." The Message Bible paraphrases it this way: "Let's keep a firm grip on the promises that keep us going. [God] always keeps God's word."

I kept a firm grip on God's promise that I was not alone in this grieving. In the midst of my pain, I drew near to God and others. Will you do the same?

Friends, whatever you do, don't sit in your loneliness or isolation. Ask God for the courage to remember that God's with you, and then talk to someone. It'll change everything for you.

PRAYER: Jesus, thank You for being Immanuel — God with us. In the midst of my holiday messes and stresses, help me to draw near to You and to others. I praise You for always being with me. In Your Name, Amen.


WEDNESDAY SUPPERS

A LOOK BACK IN OUR HISTORY By Patsy Bellman

The 1979 Annual Report (45 Years Ago) tells of the hiring of the first youth director. Jon Carson began in September working with the Jr. and Sr. High youth. He was a seminary student enrolled at the United Theological Seminary in St. Paul. 1979 is also the summer of a pastoral exchange. Rev. Art Hill and family traveled to Wales and Rev. Jolley and family came to Stillwater. "A Year of transition..." This statement is repeated over and over again in...

The 1984 Annual Report. (40 Years Ago) Rev. Arthur Hill was assigned to the Fridley UMC church after serving in Stillwater for almost 13 years. (He was pulled 2 months early because of the need in the Fridley church.) After 2 months of various lay speakers, Rev. Alan Hagstrom and a few guest pastors, Rev. Manning VanNostrand came to Stillwater at the end of June. In July, Elaine Hill also left as our Music Director, Organist and director of several choirs. The job was divided and Kathy Hauser (now Hartman) took over the positions of Music Director, Organist, and Senior Bells along with Youth Bells and Joyful Noise Choir. Janet Larson took the positions of Senior Choir Director and Teen Choir along with Jr. Choristers. A few highlights in 1984 include the installation of a three panel marker board and three panel bridal mirror in the Wesley Room. (Note - this is pre 1991 expansion and remodel so we are talking about the original Wesley Room at our church.) The church and Sunny Hill sign at the Greeley Street entrance was also designed and installed.

The 1989 Annual Report (35 years ago) tells of replacement of the old hymnals with the brand new, long awaited 1989 United Methodist hymnal. 260 hymnals were given in memory or a loved one, in honor of a loved one or as a special gift to the church. The Long Range Planning group asked that a Building Committee be appointed to begin assessing the needs of the church and move forward with the idea to expand the church building in the near future..
